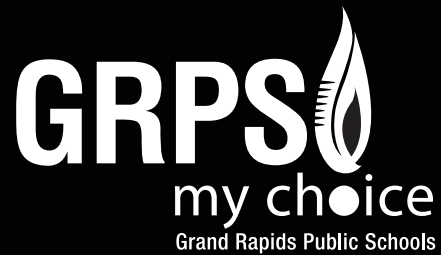

CHARLES BROWN

ATHLETIC TRAINER



Charles Brown, a distinguished member of the 2025 Ottawa Hills High School Athletic Hall of Fame, has made significant contributions to athletics at “The Big O.” His journey began as a Physical Education teacher and Assistant Football Coach, profoundly shaped by his own experience. Charles overcame a severe ankle injury during his college football days. Inspired by his recovery, Brown pursued a Master’s degree with an emphasis on Sports Medicine, ultimately becoming a proud member of the National Athletic Trainers’ Association.

His commitment to athlete welfare led him to serve as Ottawa Hills’ first Athletic Trainer for 20 years. Charles advocated for the inclusion of Athletic Trainers in high schools to ensure that student-athletes received the comprehensive care. As a member of the steering committee, Brown worked with athletes across the state at various events, fostering a culture of health and safety in sports. His 30 years of dedication within the Grand Rapids Public School District not only exemplified his commitment but also proudly represented the bold orange and black school colors.

Grateful for the support of parents, coaches, and administrators, Brown highlights the invaluable mentorship of Dr. John Edleman, who guided him throughout his Sports Medicine career. This mentorship taught him to treat the whole person, emphasizing the overall well-being of athletes rather than focusing solely on injuries.

Ultimately, Charles Brown aspires to transcend the roles of teacher, coach, and athletic trainer. His mission is to inspire individuals to reach their full potential in life, making a lasting impact on countless lives. His legacy is a testament to dedication, compassion, and the transformative power of sports.

COLIN CHRISTOPHER

Colin Christopher, a remarkable athlete and dedicated community leader, graduated from Ottawa Hills High School in 1999, leaving an indelible mark on the sports landscape. A standout in three sports, Colin excelled in football, basketball, and track, showcasing his exceptional athleticism and versatility.

Colin's athletic journey began in 1995 as a freshman on the Ottawa Hills varsity football team. He quickly established himself as a dominant linebacker, leading the City League in tackles for three consecutive years. His prowess on the gridiron earned him prestigious honors, including All-City, All-Area, All-State, and Dream Team recognition. Collins solidified his forceful reputation.

In addition to football, Colin proudly represented his school as a member of the 1996-97 State Basketball Team during his sophomore year. His talents extended to track and field, where he achieved All-State honors and was a two-time All-City Honoree in shot put and discus. His record-breaking throw in the discus not only shattered the City League record but also set a new school record—both of which remain unbroken to this day.

Colin's athletic excellence earned him a full scholarship to Division I Indiana University, where he excelled on the offensive line. As a Hoosier two-way player, he demonstrated remarkable adaptability by transitioning to the defensive line, becoming a starter and making significant contributions to the team's success in the Big Ten Conference. Graduating in 2003, he continued his pursuit of excellence at the University of Massachusetts (UMass), where he quickly emerged as one of the school's most dominant defensive linemen. Colin set the bench press record and led the team with 64 tackles, earning Atlantic 10 (A10) All-Conference Honors. He helped UMass secure an impressive 10-2 record in the A10 Conference.

Following a stint with his hometown arena football team, the Grand Rapids Rampage, Colin returned to his roots as the Varsity Defensive Coordinator at Ottawa Hills for nine years. His coaching career also included a successful tenure at East Kentwood, where he helped lead the team to the MHSAA Class A state semifinals in 2014. Additionally, he held coaching positions at Davenport University and Grand Rapids Christian. Notably, as a Varsity Assistant Coach, he helped guide Kelloggsville's Varsity Girls Basketball team to their first conference championship since 1976.

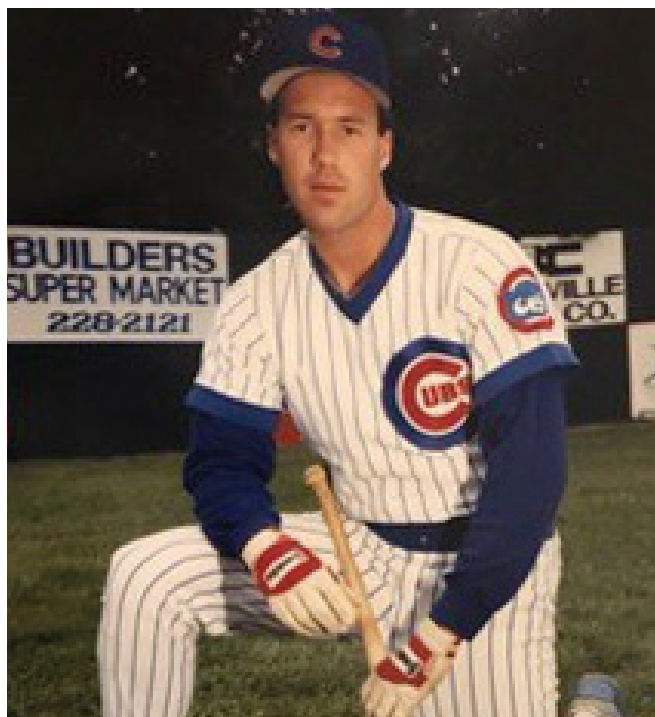
Beyond his athletic and coaching achievements, Colin Christopher is deeply committed to education and community service. Currently, he serves as the Dean of Students and Athletic Director for Waverly Community Schools in Lansing, MI. Colin continues to inspire youth and advocate for the revival of youth football in inner-city communities. Through his efforts, he has secured scholarships for families in need, further illuminating his dedication to uplifting his community and nurturing the next generation of athletes.

KEVIN “GUBBY” DALSON

Kevin “Gubby” Dalson’s athletic prowess shone brightly throughout his remarkable two-sport career, dominating in both baseball and basketball and catching the eyes of professional scouts from the moment he stepped onto the diamond. A proud 1985 graduate of Ottawa Hills High School, Kevin made history as likely the only freshman to earn a spot on the varsity baseball team under Coach Arpin. With a powerful arm, lightning-fast bat speed, and an impressive ability to steal bases, he quickly established himself as a standout player.

Over seven athletic seasons—three in basketball and four in baseball—Kevin earned three varsity letters, received three All-City Selections, was twice named to the All-Region Team, and was honored as an All-State First Team. His crowning achievement came when he was selected for the MHSAA’s prestigious “Dream Team,” an elite squad of just 18 players statewide. He capped this honor with an MVP performance in the Michigan vs. Illinois all-star game.

Kevin’s high school baseball statistics were nothing short of stellar, boasting a .438 batting average, an outstanding .962 fielding percentage, 81 stolen bases, and five home runs—four of which came during his senior year. His impressive performance earned him a Division I Scholarship to Michigan State University, where he continued to excel as the starting shortstop for all four years.

From 1986 to 1989, Kevin became the program’s all-time leader in hits, doubles, runs, and stolen bases. He continues to hold a spot among the top in career runs scored with 143. In 1988, he was named to the Big Ten All-Tournament Team. Kevin played a key role in a record-breaking season for the Spartans. His collegiate achievements were further recognized when he earned the prestigious “Golden Spikes Award.”

Kevin’s journey took a significant turn when he was selected by the Chicago Cubs in the 26th round of the 1989 MLB June Amateur Draft. As a 5-foot-9, 165-pound infielder and left-handed batter, he made his professional debut with the Wytheville Cubs in the Appalachian League. There, he appeared in 56 games, showcasing his skills with seven doubles, 11 RBIs, and six stolen bases.

Kevin Dalson’s accomplishments in baseball and basketball, combined with his athletic versatility, underscore a legacy of excellence and dedication that continues to inspire.

1984

MARJORIE “MARGE” DEIGERT

Over her high school career, Marjorie Deigert participated in 12 athletic seasons, excelling in diving and golf, each for four years. She earned a total of eight varsity letters—four in diving and four in golf. Marge set school records for both six and twelve dives, with her record for twelve dives still standing strong more than 40 years later. She was an All-City Diver throughout her four years, winning the City Championship in 1984 and finishing second in both 1983 and 1982.

During her senior year, Marge achieved All-American Honorable Mention Honors and placed second at Regionals, finishing behind Julie Farrell, who later earned an Olympic Bronze Medal. She was the only athlete on the swim team to qualify for the State Meet in her junior and senior years. Additionally, Marge served as team captain and was awarded MVP Honors for the swim and dive program. Her exceptional performance in diving earned her an athletic scholarship to Northern Illinois University.

In golf, Marge was an All-City Player all four years, serving as team captain and the top player on her team.

At Northern Illinois University, Marge was an All-Conference diver and the top diver for NIU in the Mid-American Conference. She was also the only female athlete at NIU to qualify for the Mid-American Conference Championships. After 1.5 years, she transferred to UC Berkeley, where she competed on the swim and dive team for three years. During her time at Berkeley, the team achieved a second-place finish at the NCAA Championships one year.

Following her diving career at Berkeley, Marge returned to golf and competed on the amateur circuit for three years, qualifying twice for the prestigious Women’s Public Links Championship. She maintained a 5 handicap for several years before playing professionally for one season on the Women’s Mini Tour in California.

After graduating from UC Berkeley, Marge began her career at Apple, where she developed an innovative multimedia software project—an interactive golf magazine—that won four national awards and was featured in Forbes.

After the birth of her daughter, Marge founded a school in Hawaii and later earned a Master’s degree in Education from Harvard University. Upon completing her studies, she sold her school and began working in international education. Her first position was in Thailand at the International School of Bangkok, where she taught Physical Education and coached both the men’s and women’s golf teams. She then moved to Switzerland to head the IT department at an international private school in Geneva.

Currently, Marjorie Deigert works as a private math tutor and manages a portfolio of 10 Airbnb properties, continuing her legacy of excellence and versatility across multiple fields.

Martha DeVries, a 1982 graduate of Ottawa Hills is a remarkable example of athletic excellence. She earned an impressive total of 11 varsity letters across three sports: swimming, volleyball, and softball. In 1982, she was honored by the varsity coaches as the Senior Female Athlete of the Year.

Martha excelled in swimming. She earned four varsity letters and medaled multiple times in City League Meets, both individually and relay team member. Her achievements in swimming included All-City Honors, as well Team Captain and Team MVP.

In volleyball, Martha earned three varsity letters and played a pivotal role on the 1981 and 1982 City Championship Teams. She was recognized as an All-City Selection, Team Captain, and MVP of her volleyball team.

After high school, Martha received a scholarship from Grand Rapids Junior College (now Grand Rapids Community College) to compete in volleyball and softball, where she played for two years. She later earned an Associates Degree in Business from GRJC.

Martha's dedication and leadership across multiple sports, combined with her academic achievements, highlight her as a standout athlete and role model in her community.

Tony’s athletic journey began on the baseball diamond, where he captivated fans and scouts alike. Over three varsity seasons, he earned All-City and All-Area Honors each year. His unparalleled talent culminated in his selection as an All-State player during his senior year.

In basketball, Tony exhibited agility and skill, established himself as a formidable competitor. His tenacity and athleticism solidified his reputation as a multi-talented athlete. On the golf course, his precision and strategic play distinguished him from his peers.

Tony’s talents earned him a scholarship to Division I Quinnipiac College (now Quinnipiac University). He quickly became a four-year starter in center field. His relentless work ethic and commitment to excellence earned him the coveted Most Improved Player Award in 1986, followed by All-NECC and All-New England Honors. His collegiate career peaked when he played in the All-New England All-Star Game at Fenway Park. Tony’s talent and work ethic caught the attention of professional scouts, earning him an invitation to a free-agent tryout with the New York Yankees at the legendary Yankee Stadium. This opportunity was a testament to his potential and the respect he commanded in the world of baseball.

In every sport John Dow pursued, he demonstrated not just talent but sheer dominance, combining athleticism, skill, and an unyielding competitive spirit. His legacy as a three-sport athlete is one of inspiration, illustrated with dedication, passion, and greatness is within reach. Dr. John Edleman is a pillar of support and dedication for Ottawa Hills High School, where he significantly impacted the lives of student-athletes for over three decades. His journey began in 1968 when he was encouraged by a patient to provide physical exams for students and bus drivers at Grand Rapids Public Schools. This opportunity ignited his commitment to the school, establishing a lasting relationship that would shape the lives of many.

From 1968 to 2000, Dr. Edleman generously donated his time at Ottawa Hills, offering pre-participation exams and injury evaluations for athletes in sports such as football, basketball, baseball, and track. He became a familiar face at athletic events, often accompanied by his family, creating a supportive atmosphere for athletes and their families. His three children—Mari (83), Heidi (84) and John Jr (86)—all Ottawa Hills graduates, were active in sports. Dr. Edleman, along with his wife Nancy, were enthusiastic supporters. They were often seen in their motorhome, providing comfort and community for those attending matches and events.

Dr. Edleman formed close relationships with coaches, including basketball coach Bob Hendrickson and football coach Jerry Dutcher. He saw his role as essential to safeguarding the physical and mental health of student-athletes, using sports physicals to connect throughout their high school journeys.

In the late 1970s, he partnered with athletic trainer Charles Brown, to form a dynamic team that provided comprehensive care to students. Whether on the sidelines during football games or basketball games, they ensured athletes received not only medical attention but also emotional support, helping students navigate their challenges both on and off the field.

Dr. Edleman's commitment extended beyond medical care. He was always available to listen to students and provide guidance. He supported the athletic programs including funding new equipment for the weight and training rooms, demonstrating his dedication to enhancing the student experience at Ottawa Hills. His legacy is one of compassion and service, with many students, faculty, and administrators becoming lifelong friends and patients. Dr. Edleman's unwavering support and dedication to Ottawa Hills High School has left an indelible mark, inspiring generations of student-athletes and fostering a sense of community that continues to thrive.

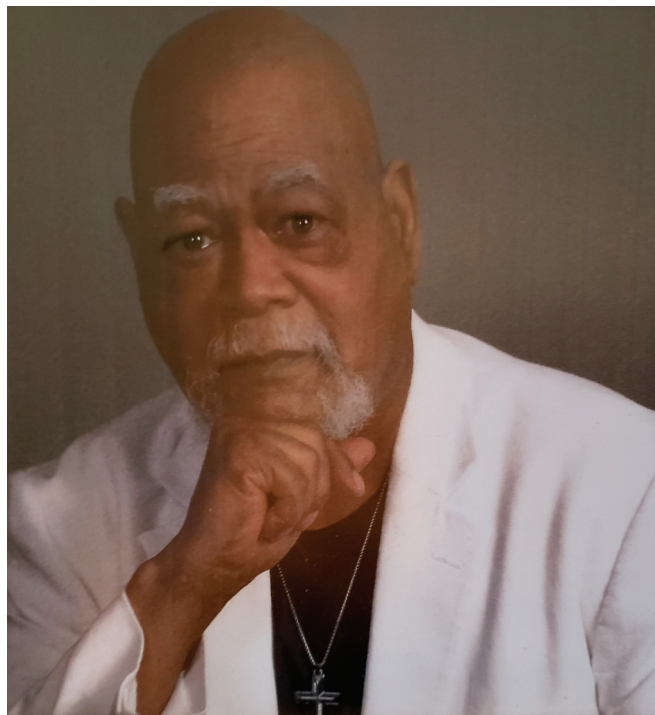
1966

William Goodson is a celebrated three-sport athlete whose remarkable talents and tenacity have earned him a well-deserved place in the Ottawa Hills High School Athletic Hall of Fame. A proud graduate of the Class of 1966, Bill’s athletic prowess in football, basketball, and track & field not only made him a standout during his high school years but also left an indelible mark on the City League.

On the football field, Bill was a dynamic offensive end and a tenacious linebacker, showcasing his versatility and athleticism while earning All-City honors on both sides of the ball. In basketball, he shined as the starting guard on a highly ranked team that achieved an impressive 16-0 record, culminating in a City Championship victory. Bill’s senior year saw him average a double-double of 18 points and 10 assists per game, demonstrating not only his scoring ability but also his vision and playmaking skills.

Bill reached new heights in track and field, making history by clearing an astounding 6 feet, 4 inches in the high jump during his sophomore year. This remarkable achievement set both the school and Grand Rapids City League records, showcasing his exceptional agility and jumping ability. His performance earned him All-City Honors and the title of Regional Champion, securing his qualification for state-level competition. This feat solidified his status as one of the top high school athletes in the region.”

After graduating from Ottawa Hills, Bill continued his education and basketball career at Davenport College. Beyond his athletic achievements, He is a proud father of two children and has dedicated his professional life to public service. Bill retired as a Captain after 20 years at Ionia State Prison and also established himself as a successful businessman. He owns the Horseshoe establishment located at the gateway to downtown Grand Rapids.

William Goodson’s remarkable journey as a three-sport athlete, combined with his contributions to the community embodies the spirit of excellence and dedication that the Ottawa Hills High School Athletic Hall of Fame seeks to honor. Bill’s Legacy as both a dominant force in athletics and respected community leader continues to inspire future generations.

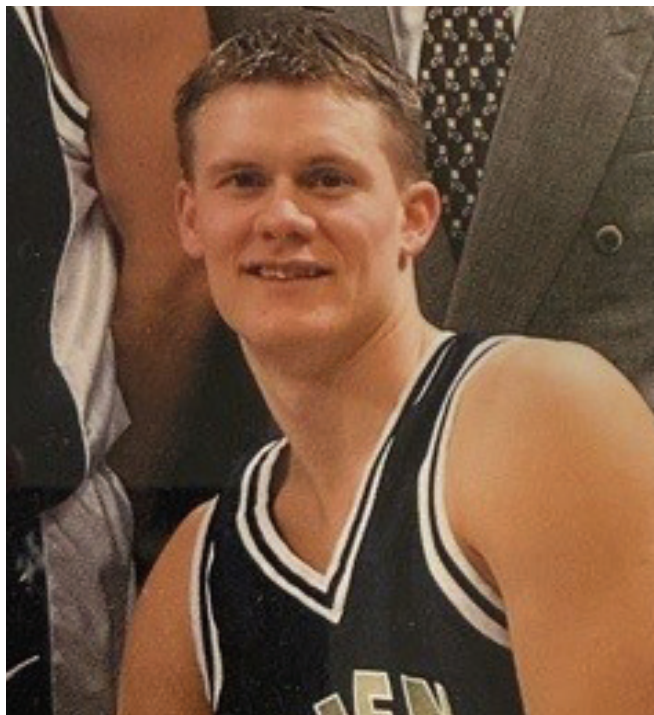
ALAN “AL” GORTMAKER

Alan Gortmaker, a distinguished athlete at Ottawa Hills, made significant contributions across multiple sports during his high school and collegiate careers. An Ottawa Hills High School graduate, Al excelled in basketball, soccer, golf, and baseball from 1992 to 1995. Under the guidance of Hall of Fame Coach Jim Eaddy, the basketball team reached remarkable heights, achieving a national ranking of 19th and a state ranking of 1st during the 1994 season. The following year, Al led his team to an undefeated City League record of 12-0 and a 26-game winning streak, culminating in a regional victory over Holland, avenging the previous year's loss.

In soccer, Al tied the school record with 29 goals in his senior season, earning All-City and All-Regional honors. Al also made his mark in baseball, leading the City League in extra-base hits and home runs, earning All-City, All-Region, and All-State Honorable Mention accolades. His exceptional performance earned him recognition as one of four recipients of the Athlete of the Year award in 1995.

Continuing his athletic journey, Al attended Cornerstone University, where he played under the legendary Coach Kim Elders. In his freshman year, he showcased his versatility by participating in basketball, soccer, and golf. Despite a quad injury that sidelined him for part of the basketball season, Al returned to help lead the team to a remarkable 37-3 record in 1999. He culminated in a National Championship victory against Bethel College. His performance in the championship game was notable, contributing 23 points and going a perfect 11 for 11 from the free-throw line. The end of his collegiate career, Al had amassed 1,395 points, ranking 27th all-time at Cornerstone. He received honors including First Team All-WHAC, All-American Honorable Mention, and All-Tournament Team in the national tournament.

Alan Gortmaker is married to Bethany and is the proud father of four children: Aiden, Gracie, Lily, and Myla. His legacy as a multi-sport athlete is honored through his induction into the Ottawa Hills Athletic Hall of Fame, a testament to his dedication, skill, and sportsmanship.

1983

ANDRE HARRIS

BASKETBALL



Andre Harris, a 1983 graduate of Ottawa Hills High School, emerged as a standout athlete, leading his team to become a top contender in the city. As a multiple varsity letter winner, he was recognized for his exceptional basketball talent both locally and across the state. Harris earned All-City, All-Area, and All-State honors, captivating fans with his dynamic performances on the court.

Standing at 6'7," he was a showstopper, known for his defensive prowess and ability to block shots into the stands, earning the adoration of spectators who delighted in his finesse, athleticism and power. Often referred to as a "gentle giant," Harris' athleticism and engaging style of play brought crowds to their feet, eliciting "ooohs and ahhs" with every move.

His remarkable skills earned him a full scholarship to play Division I basketball in the Big Ten Conference at Indiana University, where he became the first junior college player accepted by the legendary Coach Bobby Knight. Knight praised Harris in a 1985 interview, calling him "the single most athletic player he ever recruited." As a key player for the Hoosiers, Harris led the team in rebounding and ranked second in scoring. The Hoosiers held the 2nd spot in the Big Ten Conference and 16th spot in the Final AP Poll. As a result, they earned a 3 seed in the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament in the East Region. His recognition by Sports Illustrated as the all-time best Hoosier player to wear the number 34 jersey cements his legacy.

After a successful stint at Indiana, Harris transferred to Austin Peay State University, where he continued to excel, averaging nearly a double-double in points and rebounds. Following a fourth-place finish in the OVC regular season standings, Austin Peay won the OVC Tournament, earning an automatic bid to the Division I NCAA Tournament. Harris led his Cinderella team to a thrilling opening-round upset of 3 seed Illinois, 68–67. This victory marked only the third time a 14 seed defeated a 3 seed in the opening round since the NCAA tournament's expansion. Austin Peay delivered another strong performance in the next round, however the team fell to 6 seed and eventual Final Four participant Providence, 90–87, in overtime. Harris's team concluded the season with a 20–12 record.

As a standout player for the Governors, Harris earned recognition as a member of the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) All-Tournament Team and the Second Team All-OVC. At Austin Peay, he ranked in the Top 20 for both blocks and points per game, finishing 11th overall in total points in a single season, while shooting just under 50% from the field. Andre Harris' legacy as an elite athlete is unparalleled, reflecting the unwavering love and support of his mother, Sandra Thomas, who believed in his dreams every step of the way.

1991

RAUSHEDA HICKMAN-KIRK

Rausheda Hickman-Kirk, a 1991 graduate of Ottawa Hill High School, excelled in three sports—volleyball, basketball, and track & field—earning an impressive eight varsity letters. She is most celebrated as a true powerhouse in girls’ basketball. During her time at “The Big O,” Rausheda was known for her remarkable wingspan and height allowed her to dominate the paint and contribute significantly to her team’s success.

Rausheda was named to the Grand Rapids City League All-Conference Team all four years. She received All-Area Team Honors three times and selected for the Advance All-State Team during her junior and senior seasons. Additionally, the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan (BCAM) recognized her as one of the Class A Top 10 players.

Rausheda played a pivotal role as a starter for the 1989 MHSAA Class A State Championship team. The only girls’ basketball team from Grand Rapids Public Schools to achieve this prestigious title. Her talent extended to the AAU circuit, where she starred with the Kazoo Blues, competing internationally in the USSR for the World Cup. The international team brought home the World Cup Gold Championship in 1988.

High school and AAU success earned Rausheda a full scholarship to play women’s basketball at Oregon State University. After a year, she transferred to Jackson State University, a Division I HBCU powerhouse in the SWAC Conference, where she continued her basketball career.

Off the court, Rausheda is married to Leo Kirk, and together they have five children and nine grandchildren. She cherishes her role as a wife and mother. Above all else, dedicating this Hall of Fame Honor to the memory of her mother, Ruby Williams.

Rausheda Hickman-Kirk’s legacy as a dominant center and her contributions to women’s basketball continues to inspire future generations of athletes.

Ronella McGregory, a distinguished graduate of Ottawa Hills High School in 1989, exemplifies the spirit of a true student-athlete. Throughout her high school years, Roni was a remarkable four-sport athlete, earning the title of Ottawa Hills High School 1989 Athlete of the Year. She excelled in volleyball, basketball, softball, and track & field, garnering varsity letters in each sport.

As a two-year starter in Volleyball, Roni led her team to two City League Championships and one District Championship. She earned recognition on both the All-City and All-Area Teams. In track & field, Roni achieved All-City and All-Area Honors, with her 4 x 100 relay team placing fifth in the 1988 MHSAA.

Roni's basketball prowess was equally impressive; she was a three-year starter who helped her team secure four City League Championships, four District Championships, three Regional Titles, and individual recognition on the All-City team. Her exceptional athletic talent earned her a full-ride scholarship to Oakland University to continue her pursuit as an outstanding student-athlete.

At Oakland University, Roni continued to shine as a student-athlete, serving as a two-year starter on the basketball team contributing to the GLIAC Championship win in 1988 and the NCAA Division II Final Four 1989. Her contributions were recognized when she became the first recipient of the Sidney Fink Award for her outstanding student relationships. 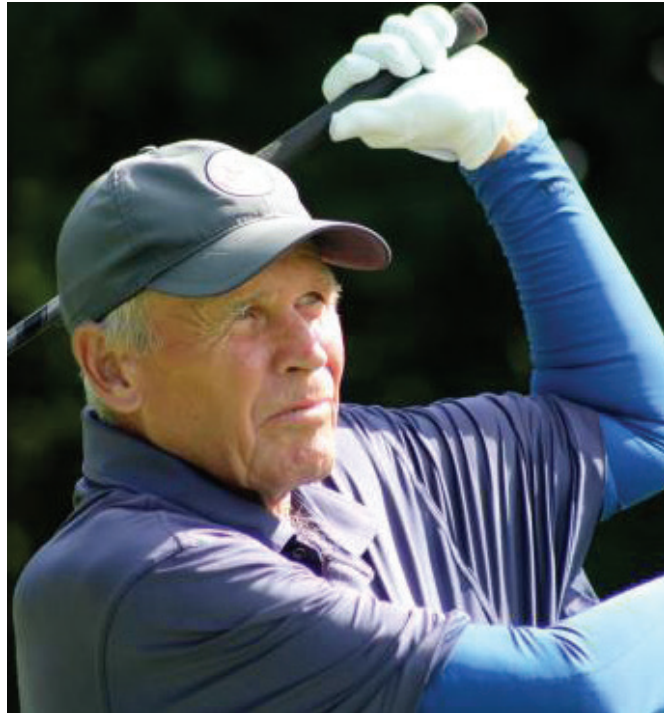

The 1997 State Championship Team, a cornerstone of pride for Grand Rapids and the Big O, was a remarkable testament to talent, teamwork, and tenacity. Concluding their season with an impressive 22-6 record, the Ottawa Hills Indians were led by the distinguished and legendary coaches Jim Eaddy and Tom Clinkscales. This squad achieved a historic milestone, becoming only the fourth State Championship Team in the History of Ottawa and Grand Rapids Public Schools.

Their journey through the District and Regional Championships culminated in a triumphant crowning as the 1997 MHSAA Class A State Champions--a feat that had not been achieved since 1969, when Ottawa Hills last reached the Final Four and the championship game.

With tri-captains Eric Large, Ernest McNeil, and Nate Boman at the helm, the team featured two McDonald's All-American Nominees, Eric Large and Jeff Rabey, adding to its legacy. Though initially ranked as a Top 25 preseason team, early setbacks only fueled their determination, transforming them into the state's underdogs and igniting a fierce spirit throughout the MHSAA State Tournament. Their unmatched heart, passion, speed, and athleticism were evident on the court, where the immense presence of twin towers Jeff Rabey and Ryan Christopher dominated the paint.

The 1997 MHSAA Class A State Champions exemplified student leadership on and off the court. Many players advanced to play at the Division I level, while also continuing their legacy as distinguished leaders in their careers and communities. Today, former players shine as successful accountants, athletic directors, attorneys, business leaders, coaches, master electricians, police officers, principals, solutions architect, and other dedicated public-school personnel, among many other distinguished roles. Their accomplishments reflect the values of teamwork, dedication, and leadership that were instilled during their championship journey. The team demonstrated the lasting impact of their experiences on and off the court.

This team, composed of multi-sport student-athletes, not only brought home the championship but also laid the foundation for excellence. Several members being individually recognized as part of the Ottawa Hills Athletic Hall of Fame. The pride and excitement surrounding this team continue to resonate, marking a Golden Chapter in the History of Big O Athletics.
